THE BEST OF OUR GROUNDS AND GARDENS

You don't have to walk far to enjoy unspoilt views of the North Wales countryside – Bodelwyddan Castle looks out onto open fields with mountains and the Irish Sea also in view. Our gardens are home to their own little delights too, which you can discover on a tour with our grounds team or at your leisure.

Walled garden

Our walled garden here at Bodelwyddan is a little bit special – a wander around the perimeter will reveal holes where fires were once lit, heating the wall to provide an even warmer sheltered climate for the plants growing within, including a 400-year-old mulberry tree.



East Lawn castle view

Take a little wander around the edge of our grounds and down onto the East Lawn to be greeted by this picture-perfect view of Bodelwyddan Castle in all its glory standing against the North Wales skyline.

Clwyddian Hills view

Walk to the top of our main hill and you'll be able to enjoy unbeatable views of the Clwyddian Hills. In just one photo you'll be able to capture Bodelwyddan Castle, its grounds, the marble church, Prestatyn and the glorious Welsh coastline.



TOWNS AND VILLAGES

From seaside resorts to the adrenaline capital of Wales, shopping outlets and a trail through Wonderland, there are plenty of towns and villages to explore around Bodelwyddan Castle.

Llandudno

The largest seaside resort in Wales, Llandudno is famous for its nearly two-mile Parade, Grade II listed pier with all the classic holiday elements you'd expect, Happy Valley gardens and chairlift, and amusement arcades. Everything you'd want from a day at the beach.

Llandudno – Alice in Wonderland Trail

Alice Liddell (the real Alice in Wonderland who inspired Lewis Carroll) spent many a summer holiday in Llandudno, and now you can follow in her fictional footsteps and search across Llandudno for the Wonderland-inspired statues and carved figures. Maps are available from all tourist information areas.

Betws-y-Coed

Surrounded by the thick Gwydyr Forest, Betws-y-Coed has an atmospheric alpine feel to it. The 'Gateway to Snowdonia' is surrounded by a network of hiking and cycling trails, some of North Wales' most picturesque castles and some unique adrenaline activities, including the world's fastest zip wire.

Rhos-on-Sea / Colwyn Bay Beach

Nestled between Llandudno and Colwyn Bay, the harbour of Rhos-on-Sea is reminiscent of a traditional Welsh coastal village. The town is home to St Trillo's Chapel, the smallest church in Britain with a capacity of only six, and the Harlequin Puppet Theatre, the only venue designed and built for puppets.

Portmeirion

Perhaps most famous as the location of 1960s TV show 'The Prisoner', Portmeirion was designed and built in the style of an Italian village between 1925 and 1975, and is now one of North Wales' premier tourist destinations, with several cafés, tea rooms, and an Italian-style homemade gelato shop.

BEACHES AND THE OUTDOORS

North Wales is famous for its mountain ranges and fresh air, but look a little closer and you'll be amazed at what surprises it has in store. We asked our team to recommend some of the 'hidden gems' of North Wales, and this is what they came up with:

Isle of Anglesey – Llanddwyn Beach

Anglesey is home to a staggering 125 miles of coastline (including our personal favourite, Llanddwyn Beach) with a network of walking routes for all levels of fitness. Trekking between dense forest and the mountains of Snowdonia, this is a hiker's heaven, a walker's wonderland, and a pedestrian's paradise.

Aber Falls

The postcode takes you to Aber Falls car park – from there it's a 6km walk to the falls, but with very little incline don't be put off by the distance, as you'll be rewarded with the sight of the iconic waterfall crashing down green-covered rocks into the river below.

Llanddulas Beach

Winner of the Green Coast award for 'hidden gems', beaches in Wales that are untouched and rugged, this long stretch of beach intersperses paths of sand and pebbles and looks out onto the Irish Sea – on a clear day you can spot the Isle of Man on the horizon.

Bodnant Garden

Snowdon Mountain Railway

Definitely the easiest way to climb Mount Snowdon, the mountain railway is also the most picturesque with panoramic views out over the national park. It is the only public 'rack and pinion' railway in the UK, allowing the trains to operate on the steep gradient of Snowdon.

The Great Orme

The Great Orme is a 207-m tall chunk of limestone rising straight out of the sea, accessible by walking, driving, cable car or the Great Orme tramway. Boasting heathlands, sheer cliffs, grassland and woodland, the area is also home to the Kashmir goats that have become famous during lockdown times.

VIEWRANGER AT BODELWYDDAN CASTLE

What is ViewRanger?

ViewRanger is one of the world's leading digital walking guides, available for all Apple and Android devices, that lets you explore local areas and walking routes like never before. We've joined forces to provide a few routes around our hotels and villages for all levels of fitness. With ViewRanger you can follow the map with or without a data connection, with viewpoints, interesting attractions and helpful advice along the way.

How do I download ViewRanger?

It couldn't be simpler!

- 1** Go to your phone or tablet's app store
- 2** Search for "**ViewRanger**" and download "**ViewRanger - Hiking Trails & Bike Rides**" by Augmentra
- 3** Use the below web address or scan the QR code and it'll open up with our selection of walks for **Bodelwyddan Castle** (it's up to you whether to create an account, although we do recommend it).

How do I get walking?

Simply tap the signpost button in the top left corner of the app and select your chosen route. You can do this from the starting point or back at the hotel, and you can even download the route so there's no need to use up your data allowance while you're wandering.



All of the walks are self-guided so that you can do them at a time and pace that suits you. Here are a few tips to help you enjoy this walk:

- Check the weather and be prepared with wet weather gear, or a coat, hat and maybe sunscreen when necessary
- Wear sensible shoes or walking boots, most of our walks are on well-worn paths, tracks, trails or woodland and pastoral land. There might be some muddy areas, gates or stiles to cross
- Pack a bottle of water, not all walks have a café or pub en-route
- Capture the beautiful countryside with your camera
- Take your mobile phone just in case of emergency
